

So what is this resource?

If you are like me, you recognize that all the pushing we do to pass tests and get through our curriculum can be a dangerous game. It is my belief that if we prepare our students to be hard workers, creative thinkers, and team players and pair that with quality instruction—the rest will simply fall into place.

What we often don't leave enough time for in our busy school day is time to nurture creativity. Whether it be letting students solve engaging real—world problems, write freely about topics they care about, research things in the world that interest them—or any other exercises in creativity, we must give students time to practice being creative.

This resource is geared toward helping you squeeze a little "creativity instruction" into your packed day! Whether you use these as warm ups, team builders, center activities, or exercises for fast finishers, this resource has everything ready for you to print and use and even has work samples to make it even more clear!

What's included?

Three different types of activities are included with this resource...including blank pages so you or students can make up your own!

"Squigglestorm" sheets where students take a provided doodle and extend it into a drawing from their own mind.

"Braintimer" sheets where students need to think "outside the box" to come up with lists, drawings, and objects that fit certain categories in a set amount of time. The goal? Find solutions that no one else has tried!

"Word Power" sheets that ask students to brainstorm ideas off of a word and to make word "ladders" that take them from one concept to the next. Creativity is key—and there are countless solutions!

These activities are great for upper elementary and middle schools students—and are a GREAT staff development activity to remind even the adults how important it is to think outside the box!


Squigglestorms!




So whereas "brainstorming" can lead to lots of creative thinking, so can "Squiggle"storming!




Braintimers!

What are "Braintimers"? This idea started as a way to try to get students to be better risk takers. So many students get overshadowed by the louder, more confident members of their classes, so I wanted to find more and more ways for all students to be involved—in a low stress, non-academic way. That being said, there is a great deal of academic power in being able to think outside the box and to work quickly—thus the "Braintimers"—activities where there is no wrong answer, just lots of opportunities to generate ideas!


Each of the following activities is meant to be quick—just a few minutes each. The power comes after the time is up. Have each child look at their work and pick the one or two things they wish to share—ask them to try to think of what other people might NOT have come up with! Remember to not get too caught up in what is right and wrong...in fact, if they are "stretching" the limits—they are thinking creatively!









Braintimer #2 Get creative! What can you turn all these into? Try to think outside the box and come up with ideas no one else will! Be ready to share your favorite.

Word Power!


What is "Word Power"? Word Power is a set of activities that helps students make connections among words and concepts. Whether generating a list of ideas on a topic or playing a word association game, creativity with words is such a valuable trait! See how much fun your students can have playing with words with the pages in this section.

The first Word Power activities involve brainstorming and are best in small groups. Consider having the students each start with their own sheet for a few minutes, then pair up, then put two pairs together to see the power of small group ideas! Encourage them to piggy back off each others' ideas.

The second set of activities involves creating a word ladder to get them from one concept to the next. Students can use just one line to make the jump or all of them—and, again, working in teams is a fun way to get the creative juices flowing!




